### Meet our Clients: Maria, Robert, and Tommy Young

During the nine month period from January to September, 2014 the Social Apostolate has helped 385 clients get their Birth Certificates, and 499 get their Georgia ID. These brief stories, using false names to preserve clients' privacy, illustrate how personal determination, joined with necessary documents help people begin to achieve economic independence and gain more control over their lives.

Maria had just turned 18 when she came to the Social Apostolate in May in need of a GA ID to find employment. By September she had found a job. We also assisted her with bus passes for two weeks until her first paycheck.

Robert was twenty-three when he came to the Social Apostolate with all the documentation he'd need to obtain his GA ID. We gave him a bus pass to go to Driver Services for his GA ID. With that

he was able to get a job within a few days. To begin it we gave him work clothing, slip resistant shoes, and two seven day bus passes.

Tommy Young first came to the Social Apostolate in mid-September, 2014 in need of a GA ID. He returned with all of the required documentation and has obtained his ID. On October 27 he returned to pick up his eyeglasses, which we had helped him get through our Prevent Blindness Program. He has been at Men's Residential for three months, and has been working at a good job for two weeks. We're proud of his success.

### Volunteer Needs

Volunteers for the Thrift Store are needed. The Thrift Store is open Tuesday-Friday, 10:00-12:30 and 1:30-3:00. This involves a weekly commitment of 2 ½ hours (mornings) or 1 ½ hours (afternoons). Please call Sr. Julie if interested: 912-233-1877 X 104.

The Birth Certificate Program is a vitally important program, because with a Birth Certificate and GA ID, people are able to find employment and move forward with their lives. Also, a certified birth certificate is necessary to access many services in our society such as housing, food stamps, child support, disability benefits, to enroll a child in school and for identification purposes.

The Social Apostolate is recognized by the GA Department of Driver Services to issue "indigent vouchers" to pay for official Georgia Identification Cards. The program is principally funded by the United Way and other donors; costs vary by state from \$9-\$60.

Center staff members, Latacia, Tom, and Sondra, work with clients who request birth certificates.



Latacia Avila is the program manager/assistant director at SA and was interviewed for this article.

According to Latacia "We are providing people with documents they need to get a job. This helps them become self-sufficient. Since the E-Verify program came into effect, employers can't hire people without proper documentation.

We help the poor obtain that proper documentation so they can get work."



Tom Fregeau, case manager at SA, was also interviewed for this article.

"Getting a birth certificate is not as simple as people think. The process has become a lot more complicated by the REAL ID ACT which went into effect in July 2012. It establishes strict requirements on the states before an ID can be issued. Much more documentation is needed for driver's licenses and IDs. This change affects everybody, but it impacts the poor even more, as they struggle to comply with the new regulations. This past year we have seen a big increase in the number of birth certificates and IDs, and an increase in the total cost," Tom said, "If you want to work you must have an ID, but you need a birth certificate to get an ID and you need an ID to get a birth certificate, It's sort of a 'Catch 22'." Tom continued. "Since 2003 the Social Apostolate has helped over 500 people per year get a birth certificate and sometimes the number runs as high as 800; that's over 5000 in the past 11 years."

In June, the Social Apostolate, with the support of the United

Way, began offering this program one day a week in Effingham County.

In September, Sondra Burns joined the staff of the Social Apostolate as a case manager.

"When I give someone their birth certificate or ID, I feel relieved," Latacia said, "because people without ID live in anxiety. My sense of relief comes from seeing their happiness as their burdens are lifted from them. Once they have appropriate documents, they can focus on making progress in their lives. It gives us a sense of accomplishment to know we have made a positive difference in the lives of many people."
